Cornwall Coastal Otter Project - Aims

- Improve recording of European otter (Lutra lutra) around the coastal fringes of Cornwall
- Investigate the diet of otters in Cornwall
- Understand how otters in Cornwall use coastal habitats
- Inform conservation and management of coastal habitats
- Develop survey and analytical skills among volunteers
- Establish links with like-minded and complementary groups, academic institutions and organisations



Collecting the evidence

- 400+ Sites over 697 km
- **30 Volunteer Surveyors**
- Target 200+ samples (110 to date) by Summer 2019
- Student project results by 2019 Publication by 2020
- Links with Devon, Somerset and Dorset surveys



Conclusion

Cornwall is a European stronghold for otters and they increasingly recorded from coastal areas

- This is probably a return to natural behaviour
- **Coastal sites are vulnerable to many pressures**
- **CCOP** aims to gather evidence of otters at or near coastal sites

Analysis of spraint contents will show the importance of marine prey


CCOP will collaborate with other groups locally and nationally
