




Must Do

- Existing projects eg Secchi Disc, iNaturalist, Marine Radar descriptions, resources required, age/ability suitability
- Kit and Equipment capabilities, costs, how to use, pros and cons
- Fun guidance on games etc to make OL entertaining
- Blue economy and careers basic knowledge
- Contacts who does what and where
- Relevant to trainees after the voyage

Must not Do


- Take too much time
