
 Understanding the ocean's influence on us and our influence on the ocean





Marine Wildlife Feathers

Cormorants (right) and shags are not the same species, but they are difficult to tell apart, being large black birds.

15 points for a cormorant or shag.



Gannets and guillemots are easy to tell apart. Gannets (left) are very big and impressive birds. Guillemots (right) are small and comical.





20 points for a gannet.

20 points for a guillemot.



The Great Black-backed Gull (left) is the biggest of our gulls.

10 points for a gull.



Terns (left) are pretty and fairly small birds, but very agile.

15 points for a tern.

Marine Wildlife Fins & Flippers

There is a wealth of life under the water which you can only see by diving, or by poking around when the tide is out. What you might see from a boat are *mega* fauna—which is how scientists describe big animals.




Whales, dolphins and porpoises are mammals like us, and they need to breathe air.

50 points for any cetacean (plus 10 points for each extra one).



Seals are difficult to spot as you only usually see the head.

70 points for a seal.



90 points for a basking shark.

At the end of the day:


6.78 and 6.67 Children; 7.2 and 7.0 Adults.


Sound Experience Educator/Deckhand Job Description


